




CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE

I am proud to present the Society's (British Omani Society) first annual Impact Report. Our work spans a wide spectrum of activity, which includes Youth, Culture, Business and the Environment. We create impact through: Events and Resources in person and online; Financial Assistance via grants, scholarships and other financial support. We provide a Place to Connect for youth, academics, government officials and private sectors of both countries, and a Platform to Showcase Oman–UK Success Stories through awards, media and speaking opportunities. We also support Education and Skills Development through training, knowledge exchange and connecting education and training establishments; and support External/Partner Projects and Events where activities align with our charitable objects. This Impact Report highlights how we have achieved our aims through key outputs over the financial year 2024/2025.

FUNDING OVERVIEW

The Society generates 100% of its own revenue, mostly from letting out the property the Charity owns, with some additional support for particular programmes from corporate sponsorship, the Embassy, private individuals and various Ministries in Oman. The Society relies on this revenue to deliver our charitable objects, maintain our premises and employ four staff to plan, deliver and promote the work we do.

We use our revenue to make grants.
The Society awarded £173,869 in grants
and sponsorship in 2024/25 to deliver our
charitable objects.

We have supported a wide range of people as well as organising **events**, **seminars and lectures** to strengthen the multi-generational relationship between Oman and the UK.





GRANTS

During 2024/2025, we awarded £173,869 in grants and sponsorship (this compares with £55,543 paid last year). The sponsorship has included some funds from our generous corporate members and other donors.

Approximately two-thirds of the 2024/25 grants, in both value and recipient numbers, went to Omanis and one-third to British Nationals.

49 Omanis and 23 British nationals benefitted from direct Society grants, including:



IMPACT SUMMARY

Green Hydrogen Production – New UK-Led Consortia

Oman has positioned itself as a global leader in green hydrogen production. Over the past year, British companies have signed significant concession agreements to lead 5 international consortia, each expected to invest £4 billion by 2040. Of these UK companies, Actis and Yamna were first introduced to Oman by The Society during our 2022 New Energy Oman Conference, and BP and Shell are Society members.



UK Innovation Drives Oman's Industrial Transformation

The British Omani Society's **Smart Industry Initiative** partners with **BSG International**, **Oxford Science Enterprises** and **IP Group** to integrate advanced UK university technologies into Oman's industrial sectors.
This strategic collaboration enhances productivity, energy security and net-zero progress, whilst expanding manufacturing capabilities for Vision 2040. Current trials involve energy, utilities and telecommunications leaders. High-level governmental support includes presentations to ministers and key stakeholders, demonstrating strong commitment to transformative industrial evolution.





Sports – Football Association Project

Sport has emerged as a key pillar in advancing Oman's Vision 2040, with a focus on youth development, gender inclusion and fostering global partnerships. In alignment with these national priorities, The Society proudly set up and ran a flagship football coaching initiative uniting the English FA and the Oman FA in a groundbreaking collaboration between the two countries.

With generous sponsorship from Oman LNG, **14 Omani coaches** completed an intensive 8-day training course in Muscat led by UK FA Coach Developers Amanda Greenslade and Danny Fenner. The programme equipped participants with UK FA certification and the skills needed to elevate football coaching standards across Oman. The Society set up and ran this whole project gaining widespread support in Oman and the UK.



Education – Building Bridges Through Learning

Education has become a key area of collaboration between the UK and Oman. The Society continues to work with the **Sultan's School, Muscat**, sending our 100th British Student Volunteer Oman (SVO) there last year, and we are now in the 13th year of our Arabic Language Scheme at the **Sultan Qaboos College for Teaching Arabic** to Non-Native Speakers in Manah. Students form part of our Society Alumni, with whom we remain engaged.



This year, The Society was delighted to welcome **five outstanding young Omani researchers** to London as
part of the London International Youth Science Forum
(LIYSF). Selected from over 340 national submissions,
these students represented Oman with innovative projects
tackling environmental and technological challenges,
from Al-powered water management to green hydrogen
production. Their participation reflects Oman's
commitment to nurturing scientific talent and
promoting global dialogue in research and innovation.

The 10th annual **New Generation Group Delegation** (NGG) was held in London on "Future Skills: Al's Role in Transforming Education and Workforce Development" (Nov 2024), with BP as the primary and long-standing sponsor of this series.

We continue to welcome new schools into our membership and are now working to link UK universities with Omani Arabic language institutes to make Oman a favoured 'year abroad' destination for language learning placements. Our aim is to make Oman as popular for these placements as Amman and Cairo.









HIGHLIGHTS AND FEEDBACK

The Society's Arabic Language Scheme sends 10 student 'future leaders' to study Arabic in Oman each year. Participants: Maria Pinder, Joseph Hearn, Thomas Buckley and Alexander Giannos report back:

'Studying Arabic at the Sultan Qaboos College for Teaching Arabic to Non-Native Speakers in Manah, Oman, was invaluable on an educational and personal level. The experience provided a unique insight into the beautiful Omani culture and its people'

The Society's long-running **Student Volunteers Oman Scheme** sends 8 students to Oman each year. Participant Bo Wakely reported:

'This scheme has helped me become more openminded and attuned to new cultures, especially after experiencing Omani national holidays, celebrations and new ways of eating and living. I have also had the privilege to share my culture and experiences with others due to the inclusivity of this wonderful country... I will always be grateful for this incredible opportunity because it has allowed me to meet some of the most inspiring and welcoming people.'

His hospitality and our engaging conversations about Oman's diplomatic priorities deepened our appreciation for the country's values and its unique contributions to regional stability.'

The Society grant funded 5 Omani field staff to attend **Outward Bound training** in the UK. Participant Mohammed Al Amri says:

'The training has significantly improved my outdoor activity skills and enhanced my instruction and coaching strategies. Additionally, the opportunity to interact with individuals from diverse cultures was amazing. Sharing the Omani culture with people from other countries was a wonderful experience for us. I would like to express my sincere thanks and gratitude to the British Omani Society for giving me this unforgettable experience.'
